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Foreword

Following the report in June 1999 by the Social Exclusion Unit the government setup the Teenage Pregnancy Unit which in turn led to the Torbay Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.

This review was setup to determ he the extent to which the Torbay Teenage Pregnancy Strategy is meeting its targets and what further can be done to reduce the rate of teenage conception and ensure that teenage parents have the opportunity and are encouraged to continue in education, training and work.

In the course of the review the Panelmetwith a greatmany people and agencies actively involved in the work with teenagers in Torbay. We also met several pregnant teenagers and teenage parents. Unfortunately it became apparent that in spite of all the hard work of the various agencies those in need were notalways aware of the sewires available.

It is difficult to say exactly how effective the Torbay strategy is, as it is in possible to obtain up to date statistics. Nevertheless, we know that a great dealofwork is being done, and will continue to be done, to provide the best service possible for the young people of Torbay.

Iwould like to thank everyone who has worked with uson this review but in particular Karen Hughes (Teenage Pregnancy Co-ordinator) and the young people them selves who came so willingly to tak to us. Thanks also to Mark Hammett for his invaluable help.

- 1. Executive Sum mary
- 1.1 The Teenage Pregnancy Review Panel considered the effectiveness and success of the services currently in place to deliver the targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.
- 12 It exam ned the sustainability of the initiatives in place, and evaluated the likelihood of Torbay meeting the national targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy. The Panelako investigated how Torbay could achieve the government's national targets on teenage pregnancy in the future.
- The Panelmade a significant number of site visits to be althealth care professionals, be also hook and youth services. It also organised an eventwhere pregnant teenagers, teenage parents and the parents of teenage parents were invited to give their views about the services provided in Torbay in relation to the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.

2. Introduction

- 2.1 In June 1999 the Social Exclusion Unit published a report into teenage pregnancy. Within the report the Unit identified two key targets:
 - To haive the under 18 conception rate of 1998 by 2010 (and to establish a firm downward trend for the under 16 rate); and
 - To increase the participation of teenage parents in education, training orwork, and to reduce the risk of bng term social exclusion for teenage parents.

Following this report the government setup the Teenage Pregnancy Unit, a cross-government unit b cated within the Department of Health with the remit to implement the targets set out in the Social Exclusion Unit's report which has become the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy

- Historically Torbay hashad a high rate of teenage conceptions when compared with some of its regional neighbours. However in 2002, the last year forwhich figures are available, Torbay's under 18 conceptions had risen to 113 which is 48.7 per thousand fem ales aged 15-17 years old. This compares with a national rate in 2002 which stood at 42.8 in England and Wales.
- However the Panelacknowledges that not all teenage pregnancies are unplanned, and that the age of the parents does not necessarily reflect on their parenting skills. The Panel therefore felt that it was in portant that there are opportunities for young people to make informed decisions regarding parenthood in Torbay.
- 2.4 Following a health scrutiny event held in September 2003 involving Members and officers of Torbay Primary Care Trust it was agreed that teenage pregnancy should become a topic for a pibtreview.
- 2.5 The scope of the review was:
- (i) To determ ine the effectiveness of the services put in place within Torbay to meet the targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.
- (ii) To examine the sustainability of the initiatives in terms of future resources and future methods of service delivery.
- (iii) To exam ine if, through jointworking, the agencies within Torbay are on schedule to meet the national targets.
- (iv) To evaluate the success of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay, and to investigate how to meet the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy targets in the future.

- 2.6 The Project Plan which sets out the full details of the review including the methodobgy adopted is attached as Appendix 2.
- 2.7 The Membership of the Panel comprised Councilors Burnidge, Bye, Cope, Darling, Pentney and Stocks. Councilor Cope chaired the Review Panel.

4. Key Findings

<u>General</u>

- 4.1 Teenage pregnancy data regarding under 18 conceptions collected in England and Walesapplies to all conceptions where the age of the mother is less than 18 years old. The rate is based on the number of under 18 conceptions per thousand 15-17 year old females in the population. The data is collected by the Teenage Pregnancy Unit and the Office for National Statistics (ONS) and follows the criteria below:
 - data is collected in calendaryears
 - data is assigned on the year of conception and not bith
 - the age of the mother is calculated at conception and not bith
 - the resident area of the mother is assigned at the time of birth or term in a tion not conception
 - the data includes all births, legal abortions and still births, but not miscarriages or illegal abortions

However the official data from the ONS is always two years out of date which makes it difficult to assess the impact the boal Teenage Pregnancy Strategy is having in Torbay.

Currently the quality of the teenage pregnancy data in Torbay is being in proved with Torbay Primary Care Trust working closely with South Devon Healthcare Trust to in prove the accuracy of the bcalstatistics. However the Panel were informed that gathering conception data from bcal secondary schools was difficult due to issues of confidentiality, and from the simple fact that schools were not always aware that their students were pregnant.

- To bay has been unfortunate that the figure used to measure its success in reducing under 18 conceptions was the 1998 under 18 conception rate figure. This figure is bw in comparison to other subsequent figures, and therefore makes it more difficult for Torbay to achieve a 50% decrease in its under 18 conception rate by 2010.
- The Panelwere informed by Torbay Primary Care Trust that there were clear links between wards with high rates of teenage conception and wards which have high levels of deprivation. The wards with the highest under 18 conception rates based on figures available in 2000 were Roundham with Hyde, Tormohun, Ellacom be and St Marychurch. All of these wards correspond to wards which were ranked as highly deprived in the English Indires of Deprivation in 2004.

Services delivering the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay

- 4.4 A Teenage Pregnancy Co-ordinator (TPC) is in postand is employed by the PC T to work two daysperweek. She is responsible for the boal in plementation of the national Teenage Pregnancy Strategy (TPS) and working with partners to deliver the Torbay Teenage Pregnancy Action Plan 2004/06. The TPC workschæly with the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board (TPPB) to provide strategic direction, develop policy and to ensure that the targets of the TPS are achieved. The Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board is also responsible for agreeing the spending of the Teenage Pregnancy Implementation Grant, evaluating ærvires and planning for the future. The TPC has also produced a leaflet called "The Guile Sexual Health Advire in Torbay" which gives teenagers advire and information on æxual health ærvires in Torbay.
- 4.5 The Teenage Pregnancy M idw ife is a new post, which has been in existence since August 2004. She is employed to develop ways to assist teenagers through pregnancy and to minimize any adverse consequences, motivate young mothers to continue education and training, and to work in partnership with others to achieve the targets of the TPS. She also hopes to play a greater of in primary and secondary schools in the future to cover issues related to pregnancy.
- 4.6 To bay Prim ary Care Trusthas developed the Emergency Horm on al Contaception Pharm acy Project to in prove the access and availability of emergency contaception for young people across To bay through participating pharm acres. The scheme isopen to females aged under 19 who can access emergency contaception from 18 pharm acres across To bay. The scheme has been in operation since 2001 but has not been wilely publicised.
- 4.7 Em ergency contraception is also available through the Casualty Departmentat Torbay Hospitaland on Mondays at all secondary schools.
- 4.8 Fam ily Planning Clinics offerconfidential advice on contraception, sexual health and issue condoms, although it was felt that the clinics were not always easily accessible or attractive to teen agers.
- The Sure Start projects in Paignton and Torquay offer a number of initiatives which contribute to the TPS such as various ante-natal classes, parent craft classes and help for teenage mothers to access services. They also operate a "buddy" system where pregnant teenagers are paired up to give each other support during and after their pregnancy.
- 4.10 SeveralG Pssurgeries are developing "drop-in centres" to encourage young people to access their health centre services. Receptionists have been trained to be more teenage friendly and in aginative methods like cafes and gym sare being used by some surgeries to

- capture the attention of young people in relation to their health and general wellbeing.
- 4.12 The Teenage Inform ation and Advice Centre (TC TAC) at Paignton Community and Sports College offers confidential information and advice to the school's students. The service is staffed at lunchtimes by GPs, practice nurses, schoolnurses and health visitors. The service supplements the school's SRE curriculum but also offers advice on all health related matters and not just sexual health issues.
- Dartington Tech is a bcalcharity which runs several courses known as Parents Plus for pregnant teenagers and teenage parents. These courses form one of only two Parents Plus courses that are run in the UK. The courses are delivered three days a week over 20 weeks and consist of a mixture of a cademir study and life skills.
- 414 Checkpoint is an inform ation and advice centre for 11-22 year olds run by the Children's Society, and deals with a range of issues including sexual health. The centre can offer advice to young people through group sessions and via one to one counselling. Checkpoint has been heavily involved in the development of the bcalTPS and is on the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board.
- 4.15 The Youth O ffending Team (YOT) liases regularly with the TPC and identifies the progress made on the bcalaction plan. A contact officer is in place at the YOTw ho deals with all sexual health matters and receives information from the TPC and cascades it to the other members of the YOT. The YOTako has the option to refer specific cases to the TPC foreducation and support. The YOThave had the opportunity to contribute to the bcalTPS but are not represented on the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board.
- Brixham Youth Enquiry Service runs a drop-in centre giving advice and support to 11-25 yearolds. The centre fully supports the TPS and is currently training sixth form students so that they will be able to peer educate others on sexual health and a boholie lated matters. A blough they feed back to the TPC and are keptwellinformed they find it

- difficult to attend the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board meetings due to a lack of staff.
- 4.17 Torbay's Youth Service also provides inform ation, advice and support on sexual health matters through Chill'd Out, usually in single sex groups which many young people seem to prefer. There is also a session at a boal nightclib for under 18's when leaflets and "The Guide Sexual Health in Torbay" are distributed. The Youth Service has played a full part in the development of the stategy, is represented on the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board and attends all events and workshops. However they feel they cannot give the service they would like due to underfunding and poor retention of trained and experienced staff.
- 4.18 Looked A fterChildren in Torbay are covered by the strategy under the supervision of the TPC who is due to develop the work done with these young people in the future.
- 4.19 We strountry Housing Association provides two supported housing projects that provide accommodation for pregnant teenagers and teenage couples with children. In addition to accommodation a variety of services are provided at the projects.
- 420 WestCountry Theatre Company performs "Lovebites", a play about sex and relationships for secondary school students. This work is funded by the Local Education Authority.
- 421 Care to Learn is a government sponsored childcare scheme which is designed to encourage young parents under 19 to go back to education by offering free childcare. It is not directly connected to the TPS.

Effectiveness of the services in Torbay

- 422 The quality of sexeducation in schools seem sto be varied and is often a one offlesson which is easily missed by some students. Many teenagers feel that they had learn to one from "Lovebites" the West Country Theatre Company performance, than from the formallessons they received in school.
 - How ever the LEA has recognised that it needs to make specialist training available for teachers in Torbay on the teaching of Sex and Relationship Education in schools. Therefore a number of Torbay's secondary school teachers are currently enrolled on a national accreditation scheme for teachers and school nurses who deliver SRE.
- Pregnant teenagers had major concerns over the lack of affordable accommodation for young parents in Torbay. They also thought that it was unlikely that they would access the Care to Learn scheme as they intended to bok after their babies before returning to education, by

- which time they would be other than 19 and therefore would be unable to access the scheme.
- 424 The work of Checkpoint, South Devon College and Dartington Tech washighly praised but many pregnant teenagers were disappointed with the services offered by Torbay's Youth Service.
- 425 Many pregnant teenagers were not generally aware of the Emergency Horm on all Contraception Pharmacy Project, and also found difficulty in accessing Family Planning Clinics.

How sustainable are the initiatives in place in Torbay which are delivering the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy?

- 426 The Teenage Pregnancy In plem entation Grant, which is ring fenced, munsout in March 2006. Funding for the TPC ends in March 2005, although it is hoped funding will be found for another year.
- Dartington Tech also faces funding difficulties. Present funding for the Parents Plus courses ends in December 2005 and they are boking for alternative sources of finance.
- 428 Funding for TC TAC is also under threat as the funding from Torbay Prim ary Care Trust is due to be reduced at the end of 2004/05.
- 429 The Panelwere also informed that the current Teenage Pregnancy
 In plementation Grantlacks the financial resources to open services at
 the weekend when they are most needed by the teenagers of Torbay.

Is Torbay on schedule to meet the national targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy?

- 430 The Panelbecame aware that the bw base line figure from 1998 for under-18 teenage conceptions would make it difficult for Torbay to achieve a 50% reduction by 2010. It is also difficult to estimate the current success of the bcalstrategy as all the available figures are two years out of date.
- 431 HoweverTorbay is currently experiencing a downward trend in its under16 conception rate with a conception rate of55 perthousand fem alesaged 13-15 yearsold in 2001 compared with a national rate of 79.2001 was also the second year in a row that Torbay's Under16 conception rate was bwerthan the national rate.
- 4.32 There are doubts about whether Torbay will meet its target in relation to increasing the participation of teenage parents in education, training or work.
- 433 Many bcalhealthcare professionals stated that it was unrealistic to expect the bcalhealth agencies and schools to control the level of

teenage conceptions as it is extremely difficult to control the sexual behaviour of teenagers. One bcalGP stated that if the government was serious about tackling teenage pregnancy it needed to make a commiment to re-educate a whole generation, which could take up to 10 years.

How successful has the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy been in Torbay?

- 4.34 In statistical term of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay has not been successful as it is failing to make a significant in pacton reducing the under 18 conception rate. The under 18 conception rate in 2002 was 48.7 per thousand 15-17 year old fem also which is one of the highest rates in the south west region. Nevertheless this figure needs to be placed in perspective as in 2001 Torbay's under 18 conception rate was a bw 39.8 per thousand 15-17 year old fem also, which was significantly by erthan the national rate of under 18 conceptions for that year at 42.5 per thousand 15-17 year old fem also.
- 135 Nevertheless Torbay hashad some significant success in establishing a firm downward trend in its under 16 conception rate since 1999.
- 4.36 The TPC hasbegun to instigate a multiagency approach which although still in its early days does seem to be producing a more coordinated approach to the delivery of the strategy and its services.
- 437 The production and the circulation of "The Guide SexualHealth Advice in Torbay" is seen as a positive step forward.

What can be done in the future in Torbay to meet the national targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy?

- 438 Lisessential that the funding for the strategy stays in place for all the projects currently operating in Torbay.
- 439 The growing problem of a boholabuse among Torbay's teenagers which leads them to take risks with their sexual health needs to be tackled in the future.
- 4.40 Schoolgovernors in Torbay need to be persuaded of the benefit of increasing the sexual know ledge of their students.
- 5. Conclusions
- 5.1 The Panelwere concerned about the ack of up to date statistics. This ham pers the monitoring of the progress within the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.
- The Panelwere in pressed with the number of agencies involved in delivering the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy at this early stage.

- 5.3 The Panelfelt that continued funding must be in place to advance the strategy.
- 0 veralthe Panelfelthat the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay is travelling in the right direction, although it is difficult to judge the level of achievem entwith out of date figures and a lack of interaction between agencies.
- The Panelwere not convinced that the sewires supporting the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay are being userled. It is in portant that the sewires are user friendly and easily accessible, enabling young people them selves to make informed choices. The Teenage Pregnancy Strategy must not seem to be moralising.
- 5.6 Many good exam plesofgood practice were observed. The Panel were particularly in pressed with the work carried out by the TC TAC Centre at Paignton Sports and Community College, Dartington Tech and Westcountry Theatre Company.

6. Recommendations

That it be recom m ended to the Executive:

6.1 That there be more co-ordination between the agencies involved in delivering the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy in Torbay.

Objective of the Review

To review the effectiveness of the sewire sprovided within Torbay that are responsible for fulfilling the targets of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy. To determ ine whether the targets in relation to teenage pregnancy can be met in Torbay. To consider what can be done to reduce the rate of teenage conception in Torbay and in prove the participation of teenage parents in education, training and work.

Introduction

Ata health scrutiny induction eventheld on the 18th Septem ber2003 Mem berswere asked to consider topics for a pibtHealth Scrutiny Review . A num beroftopicswere suggested for the pibtreview including drugsrelated issues, services for older people and teenage pregnancy. Following this a meeting took place with the Chief Executive and Chaim an of Torbay Primary Care Trustat which both of them identified Teenage pregnancy as an appropriate topic for a pibtreview.

To bay's teenage conception rate comparespoorly at both a national and regional level. In 2002 To bay sunder 18 conceptions stood at 113 which is a conception rate of 48.7 per thousand. This compares with a national rate in England and Wales of 42.8 per thousand. Therefore To bay's teenage conception rate is significantly higher than the national rate based on the 2002 statistics. Comparisons with other bcalauthorities in the south we stake show Torbay to have a high rate of teenage conceptions with only Bristol recording a higher rate in 2002.

There are also some significant variations between wards in Torbay in term sof teenage conceptions. Torm ohun, Elacom be and Blatchcom be are the wards with the highest rates of teenage conceptions, with Berry Head with Furzeham emerging as a ward with an increasing rate of teenage conception in recent years.

NationalBackground

The Social Exclusion Units Report on Teenage Pregnancy, published in June 1999, set out two national targets: to halve the under 18 conception rate by 2010 (and to establish a firm downward trend for the under 16 rate); and to increase the participation of Teenage parents in education, training or work, to reduce the irrisk of long-term social exclusion.

Following this Report the government setup the Teenage Pregnancy Unit, a cross-government unit beated within the Department of Health with the remit to implement the targets set out in the Social Exclusion Units Report which have become known as the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy.

The target to reduce the under 18 conception rate by 50% by 2010 is a joint Department of Health and Department for Education and Skills Public Service Agreement. The NHS Plan has an interimatarget of a 15% reduction in under 18 conceptions by 2004.

These national targets have been translated into key priorities for health, education and social care over the next three years in the Priorities and Planning Fram ework (PPF) 2003/06. Also included within the Priorities and Planning Fram ework is the target "to achieve agreed botal teenage conception reduction targets while reducing the gap in rates between the worst fifth wards and the average by at least a quarter.

AllPrimary Care Trustshave a LocalDelivery Plan that, at a minimum, addresses each of the priority areas set out in the Priorities and Planning Fram ework. For the teenage pregnancy targeteach PC Thas set out a boal trajectory for the under 18 conception rate which will result in the achievem entof the targets. Progress against their teenage pregnancy trajectory will be monitored by the Strategic Health Authorities and Regional Teenage Pregnancy Co-ordinators.

The under18 conception rate was included in the 2002/2003 perform ance indicatorset for Primary Care Trusts which was the basis upon which PC Ts received a perform ance rating of three, two, one or zero stars. It is also one of two cross cutting indicators in the Local Government Best Value Indicatorset for 2003/2004. This means it will be included as part of the Comprehensive Performance Assessment which determines the performance rating of bcal authorities, giving a score of Excellent, Good, Fair, Weak or Poor.

LocalBackground

A stategic planning group was established in early 2000 in Torbay to bok at the existing service provision, priorities for future service development and to make the links between all of the planning forum swhich in pacton young people services.

This strategy group (now called the Teenage Pregnancy Partnership Board) is responsible for contributing to the developm entand the implementation of the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy. Membership of this Board includes members of the Torbay Primary Care Trust, Torbay Council, Sure Start Paignton and Torquay, South Devon Healthcare Trust, Connexions, Community Education, Check Point, schoolnurses, bcalschools, Family Planning, Chilld Out Youth Service, Brixham Youth Enquiry Service, the Garage Youth Service, the Youth Offending Service, Westcountry Theatre Company, Council br Jenny Faulkner and a young mum.

The Teenage Pregnancy partnership Board reports directly to the Children and Young People Strategic Partnership and meets bim onthly to set the agenda for the year in term so freceiving perform ance reports for funded services and to agree future spending and the monitoring of spending.

Recentexam plesofwork done to tackle teenage pregnancy within Torbay include the training of health professionals to deliver the Apause program me in schools along side teaching staff, theatre productions in school, one to one support sessions with vulnerable people, various group sessions held by youth and outreach workers and enhanced hours of availability and training for school nurses.

The Teenage Pregnancy Strategy also links very closely with other bcalplans being developed in Torbay to provide a joined up multiagency approach to teenage pregnancy. Some examples of other plans that link to the teenage pregnancy are Connexions, Sure Start and the Strategic Plan for Children in Torbay.
