

The 'demographic' story


- Inequalities
 - Cost around £75 to £80 million per year
 - Lost taxes
 - Higher welfare payments
 - NHS healthcare costs
- Ageing population
 - Secondary care costs rise sharply from age 75+
 - Demographic change is expected to see inpatient costs increase by £1m by 2020 (85+)







The 'demographic' story



Three year average	0 to 19	75+
Population	28,721	17,050
Spells	5,285	8,981
Cost	£ 161	£ 1,030







The 'starting well' story

- Increasing fertility rate locally
 - Number of live births up from 1,300 to over 1,400
- Poorer start to life
 - Higher smoking in pregnancy rates
 - Lower sustained breastfeeding
- Higher levels of relative child poverty







The 'developing well' story

- Unintentional and deliberate injuries
 - Significantly higher in Torbay
- Under 18 conceptions
 - Higher rates in more deprived communities
- Children looked after / children in need
 - Rates are amongst the highest nationally
- Troubled families
 - Significantly higher rate in Torbay







The 'living well' story

- Significantly high mortality in 15 to 64 age group
- Higher rate of alcohol related hospital admissions – noticeable social gradient
- Higher rates of LD; improving outcomes (LE)
- Poor housing conditions in Torbay
- High benefit dependency in the population







The 'ageing well' story

- Gap in LE at 75
- High (volume) emergency admissions for over 65's
 - Injuries; fractured NOF
- High prevalence of LTC's
- High visual and hearing impairment in the bay
- High rates of carers in Torbay
- Around 12,400 65+ live alone







Summary of priorities from this JSNA

- Integration of services for children, public health and safer communities on a locality basis
- Continued focus on inequalities, both for this board and others
- Management of long term conditions
- Alcohol and teenage pregnancy
