Brief overview of proposal or service development	The proposal to establish a second specialist surgical centre for gynaecological cancers in Cornwall, alongside the current surgical centre at the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital, Exeter South Devon patients requiring surgery for gynaecological cancers currently receive this surgery at the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital, Exeter. Therefore, the recommendation that the Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust be designated as the peninsula's second specialist centre would not impact upon the current patient flow.

Brief overview of factors which have led to this proposal or service development	The case for the reconfiguration of gynaecological cancer services is embedded, and argued for, in the Improving Outcomes Guidance for this patient group. The Peninsula Cancer Network (for Devon and Cornwall), and the peninsula's four primary care trusts intend to apply this guidance as mandated in both the IOG and the recent Cancer Reform Strategy. The term 'gynaecological cancers' covers cancers of the: • cervix • endometrium (lining of the womb) • ovaries • vagina/vulva These cancers are relatively rare. Even taken together, they affect only around half as many women as breast cancer.

	Cancer of the female genital organs has a national incidence of 46 per 100,000. In the Peninsula there are about 650 cases a year requiring surgery.
	The shape of cancer services around the NHS is recommended in national Improving Outcomes Guidance. The Strategic Framework for the NHS and the Cancer Reform Strategy require the full implementation of all IOGs for cancer. All primary care trusts are expected to commission services that are compliant with IOGs, demonstrating that they are offering the best and safest care for patients.
	The IOG aims to bring together specialist staff, so they see enough patients each year to maintain and improve their skills, at centres with all necessary equipment and facilities. But it also aims to provide services as close to the patient's home as is compatible with high-quality, safe and effective treatment.
	In Devon and Cornwall, the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital was designated in 2004 as the sole Specialist Gynaecological Cancer Centre. Royal Cornwall Hospitals (Truro) and Plymouth Hospitals are both Local Gynaecological Cancer Units, with non-surgical treatment of all gynaecological cancers being provided in all five acute trusts, including South Devon Healthcare (Torbay) and Northern Devon Healthcare (Barnstaple).
	The Peninsula Cancer Network, the four primary care trusts serving Devon and Cornwall and the five acute trusts have therefore agreed that a second Specialist Gynaecological Cancer Centre should be created. The national Cancer Action Team has also agreed with the principle, given the number of additional patients identified.
Overall objective of proposals (eg. improving quality of services, more cost effective service etc)	To improve outcomes (survival rates) for women with gynaecological cancers.
Details of public and patient <u>involvement</u> undertaken to date and how this has shaped proposals	As this recommendation does not impact upon the patient flow for Torbay, Torbay Care Trust has not yet undertaken any local consultation.
