# Proposals for service change, income generation and efficiencies

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#### Introduction

This document sets out details of all of the proposals for service change, income generation and savings in order to produce a balanced budget for 2020/2021.

We have included the high level environmental, economic and equality impacts of each proposal. Where a draft proposal has been assessed as having a material impact on service users, an Equalities Impact Assessment has been prepared. This is a mechanism which helps the Council to determine the impact of its proposals. It is particularly useful for determining how proposals will affect groups or communities who experience inequality, discrimination, social exclusion or disadvantage.



Section 1	Background Information
1.	What was the initial the proposal / issue?
	There would be an investment of up to £0.5 million in public toilet provision at Meadfoot, Broadsands, Goodrington North, Abbey Meadows and Preston Bus Shelter. (This is in addition to the investment already underway at Preston Beach Central.)
	This investment will be funded from the closure of the toilets at Preston (North and South) and Goodrington South (once the new provision is in place in Preston Beach Central and Goodrington North, respectively) and the closure of the toilets at Corbyn Head (if third party redevelopment proposals are not forthcoming.)
	Negotiations are underway in relation to a third party taking over provision of the toilets at Fishcombe.
2.	What is the current situation?
	Since 2018, Healthmatic has operated 16 public toilets across Torbay. Healthmatic were also asked to manage the proposed transfer of seven further toilets to adjacent businesses. If an alternative provider was not found, it was expected that these toilets would remain open and be maintained at current levels by Healthmatic.
	Four other toilets were retained by the Council with the view to a future alternative operator being identified by the Council.
	The toilets which are proposed to be closed are in a poor condition and would need significant investment (over and above that which is proposed for the new toilets) to be bring them up to a good quality standard.
3.	What options have been considered?
	The work by the Council and Healthmatic to identify alternative operators for the toilets has, in the main, been unsuccessful for a number of reasons although negotiations are continuing in relation to an alternative provider for the public toilets at Fishcombe.

	In identifying areas where the Council could make savings, consideration has been given to the future operation of the 11 toilets outside the main Healthmatic contract. These could have been transferred to any town council that the Council could have established. This option is no longer being recommended by the Cabinet. A further option would be to close these toilets with no alternative provision being in place.
4.	What is the relationship with the priorities within the Partnership Memorandum and the Council's Principles?
	The proposal is part of the Partnership's commitment to ensuring a thriving economy and to tackling climate change.
	The investment in public toilets will ensure sufficient capacity at all major resort areas as well as offering much improved facilities for both residents and tourists. Six of the new toilets have won Platinum awards at a national Toilet awards ceremony and Torbay's toilets as a whole are ranked in the top 20 of all facilities in the country, giving more prestige to the resort concept.
	Investment in public toilets has seen reduced usage of water and energy at the new or refurbished facilities, giving not only cost savings but significant environmental benefits.
	The proposal ensures that the Council is using its reducing resources to best effect.
5.	Who will be affected by this proposal and who do you need to consult with?
	Residents and visitors to Torbay will be affected by this proposal. Consultation will take place with the general public, community groups and trade organisations (including the Chambers of Trade and the English Riviera BID Company).
6.	How will you propose to consult?
	This consultation will be promoted across Torbay – through our networks and those of our partners and through the mainstream and social media.

	Consideration was also given to the proposal by the Overview and Scrutiny Board's Priorities and Resources Panel. The recommendation in relation to this proposal was:
	That the Cabinet be requested to ensure that toilet provision is maintained at Goodrington South Sands, Preston North and South and Corbyn Head.
11.	Amendments to Proposal / Mitigating Actions
	Having considered the feedback from the consultation, the proposal has been amended to increase the investment in public toilets to £0.6 million.
	This will enable a new pay-per-use single pod to be installed at Goodrington South, with the existing block at that location being demolished. The existing block is in extremely poor condition. This revised proposal will ensure that there is a sustainable, fit-for-purpose facility in this location.
	The toilets at Corbyn Head will remain open during 2020/2021 whilst a third party delivery partner is sought to run the facility moving forward.
	As a result of the change to this proposal, the revenue budget for public toilets the 2020/2021 financial year will increase by £50,000.
