However, I am equally aware that many teachers are worried about overloading pupils and parents, who are often struggling to balance competing priorities in challenging home learning contexts. These are not easy positions to square.

This newsletter is designed to give you some suggestions for ways to engage pupils who are home-learning, while continuing to be sensitive to the needs of them and their families. It is worth considering how home-learning gives us an unprecedented opportunity to offer relevant, inclusive resources to parents who may not always have had a very positive view of RE.

RE and Black Lives Matter?



With the recent widespread activism and protest over the killing of George Floyd, many teachers of RE are wondering how this affects our approach to our subject. In her book Religious Education and the Public Sphere, Pat Hannam argues that the aim of education is to 'bring the child to action'. Our RE should do more than just provide a passive reflection of religious and non-religious worldviews. We need to help pupils engage with ideas in an active context.

When Donald Trump used tear gas to clear protesters away from his path, so he could be pictured holding up a Bible outside a Church in Washington DC, he made a significant statement about religion and power. Watch <u>James Corden's interview</u> with his dad on 'how to hold a Bible' to see some interesting critique of these events.

Here is an interesting <u>blog</u> about how RE can be crucial tool in helping to uncover the implicit and structural racisms which still oppress the majority of the world's populations. 'Put simply, much mainstream thinking around and about religion is colonialist and racist.'
