Introduction:

In Torbay, health and social care services are provided by Torbay and South Devon NHS Foundation Trust ('the Trust') and funded by Torbay Council ("the Council"). This policy explains Direct Payments in Torbay.

Our purpose is to support and help people to stay as well and independent as possible, able to manage their own well-being in their own homes wherever possible. Where care is needed, we want people to have a choice about how their needs are met and only tell their story once. People receiving services need to be at the heart of what we and providers deliver together.

Our Principles

- We want people to remain in control of their lives, to remain independent and to have the opportunity to make their own choices about their care and support arrangements.
- We will achieve this by our Direct Payment system being as simple as
 possible and allowing people true autonomy to meet their eligible care and
 support needs.

What is a Direct Payment?

A Direct Payment is one way of having a personal budget/Personal Health Budget. It is funding given to a person who has been assessed as being eligible for social care support. It will give them flexibility to arrange and purchase care and support for themselves to achieve the outcomes agreed in their care and support plan. Receiving a Direct Payment will not affect any entitlement to benefits.

Who can have a Direct Payment?

A person can have a Direct Payment if:

- They have the capacity to ask for a Direct Payment or, if they do not have capacity, a request by a nominated or authorised person is made on their behalf.
- Their needs meet the Care Act 2014 eligibility criteria for care and support.
- For Social Care Funded people their income and capital are below the capital threshold, which will mean that the local authority must contribute to the cost of their care and support.
- They can manage the Direct Payment either by themselves or with support from a nominated or authorised person. If someone doesn't have the capacity to manage a Direct Payment, we can arrange for someone to receive the Direct Payment on their behalf, for example, a friend or family member. It cannot be a paid carer unless they are directly related. People may still choose for us to arrange some or all their care and support. If someone is already receiving care and support from us, they can choose to





change to a Direct Payment at any time. Similarly, someone receiving a Direct Payment may choose to cease receiving the payments and have us arrange their care and support.

Who cannot have a Direct Payment? (See appendix 1)

The law specifically excludes people who are placed under certain conditions by courts relating to drug/alcohol dependencies.

Direct Payments for equipment

At present equipment that has been prescribed by the Council's Occupational Therapists is ordered directly from an independent organisation contracted by the Council. They provide a range of good quality and good value equipment from which choices can be made. You can only use a Direct Payment for equipment if we cannot procure the item from our contracted provider.

Direct Payments for young people

Financial assessments do not apply to Direct Payments provided to children and young people under the age of eighteen. The national eligibility rules are only relevant to Adult Social Care, they do not apply to assessments carried out by Children's Social Care.

How Direct Payments work

We aim to make setting up and managing Direct Payments as simple as possible. We will provide clear information and advice to support people with a Direct Payment.

Our procedures will be as "light touch" as possible. The procedures we do have are to make sure that we:

- Protect Direct Payment users and/or the people who manage a Direct Payment on their behalf, for example, from financial abuse.
- Make sure that people's eligible care and support needs are being met.
- Protect council tax money to make sure it is spent on meeting eligible care and support needs.

We always recommend people obtain independent financial advice and can provide details of how to do this.

Appendix 1

Adults Whose Needs the Local Authority Must Not Meet by Making Direct Payments

Direct payments may not be used to meet the needs of people who are:

- a) subject to a drug rehabilitation requirement, as defined by section 209 (drug rehabilitation requirement) of the Criminal Justice Act 2003 ("the 2003 Act"), specified in a community order (as defined by section 177 (community orders) of that Act, or a suspended sentence order (as defined by section 189 of that Act).
- b) **subject to an alcohol treatment requirement**, as defined by section 212 of the Criminal Justice Act 2003, specified in a community order (as defined by section 177 of that Act), or a suspended sentence order (as defined by section 189 of that Act).
- c) released from prison on licence
 - i. under Chapter 6 of Part 12 (sentencing: release, licenses and recall) of the 2003 Act or Chapter 2 of Part 2 (effect of custodial sentences: life sentences) of the Crime (Sentences) Act 1997 ("the 1997 Act"), subject to a non-standard licence condition requiring the offender to undertake offending behaviour work to address drug or alcohol related behaviour; or
 - ii. **subject to a drug testing requirement** under section 64 (as amended by the Offender Rehabilitation Act 2014) (release on licence etc: drug testing) **or a drug appointment requirement** under section 64A (release on licence etc: drug appointment) of the Criminal Justice and Courts Services Act 2000.
- d) required to comply with a drug testing or a drug appointment requirement specified in a notice given under section 256AA (supervision after end of sentence of prisoners serving less than 2 years) of the 2003 Act.
- e) required to submit to treatment for their drug or alcohol dependency by virtue of a community rehabilitation order within the meaning of section 41 of the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000 or a community punishment and rehabilitation order within the meaning of section 51 of that Act.
- f) **subject to a drug treatment and testing order** imposed under section 52 of the Powers of Criminal Courts (Sentencing) Act 2000.
- g) required to submit to treatment for their drug or alcohol dependency by virtue of a requirement of a community payback or probation order within the meaning of sections 227 to 230 of the Criminal Procedure (Scotland) Act 1995 or subject to a drug treatment and testing order within the meaning of section 234B of that Act; or





h) released on licence under section 22 or section 26 of the Prisons (Scotland) Act 1989 (release on licence etc) or under section 1 (release of short-term, long-term and life prisoners) or 1AA (release of certain sexual offenders) of the Prisoners and Criminal Proceedings (Scotland) Act 1993 and subject to a condition that they submit to treatment for their drug or alcohol dependency.

The Mental Capacity Act 2005

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 provides a statutory framework for people who lack capacity to make decisions for themselves, or who have capacity and want to make preparations for a time when they lack capacity in the future.

It sets out who can take decisions, in which situations, and how they should go about this. It covers a wide range of decision making from health and welfare decisions to finance and property decisions.

There is a legal duty placed upon all staff to apply the Mental Capacity Act 2005 in all circumstances where a person is required to consent to 'acts in connection with care and treatment' and where there is reason to doubt the person's mental capacity to do so.

Infection Control

All staff will have access to Infection Control Policies and comply with the standards within them in the workplace. All staff will attend Infection Control Training annually as part of their mandatory training programme.
